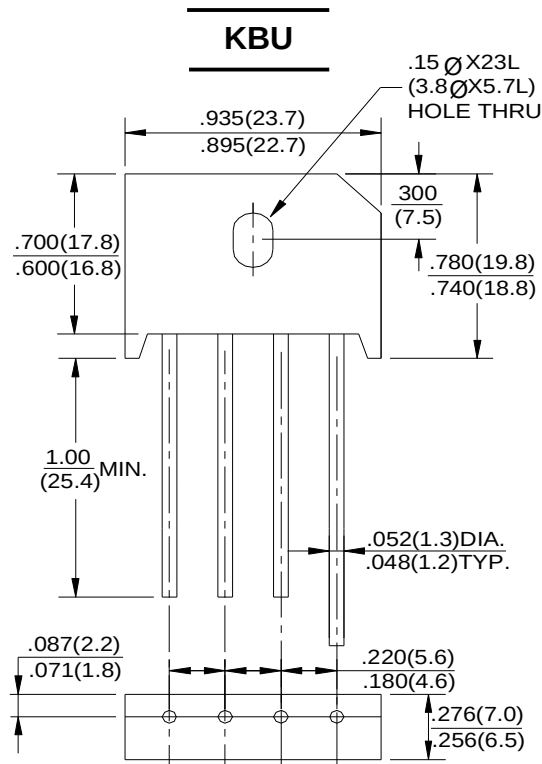


SILICON BRIDGE RECTIFIERS

FIG. 1 – MAXIMUM FORWARD SURGE CURRENT

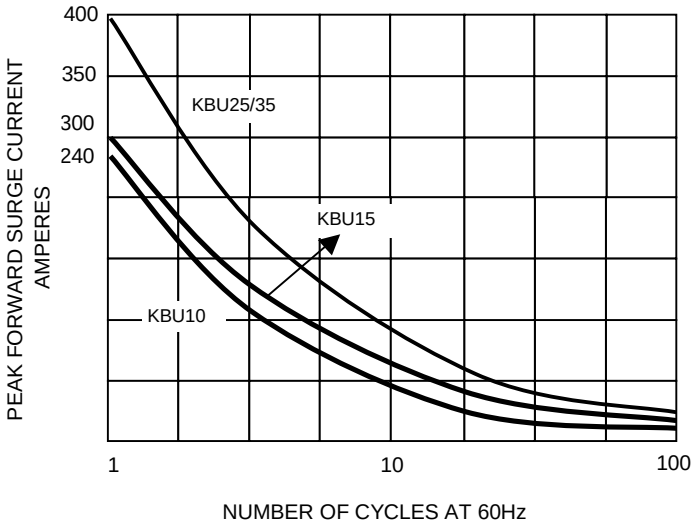


FIG. 2 – DERATING CURVE OUTPUT RECTIFIED CURRENT

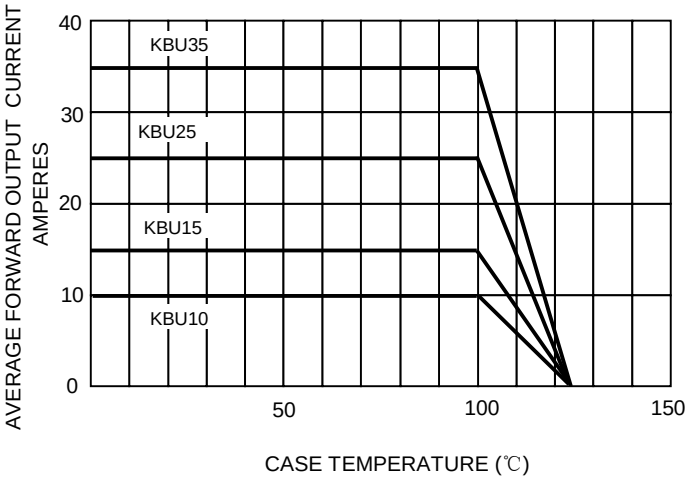


FIG.3– TYPICAL FORWARD CHARACTERISTICS

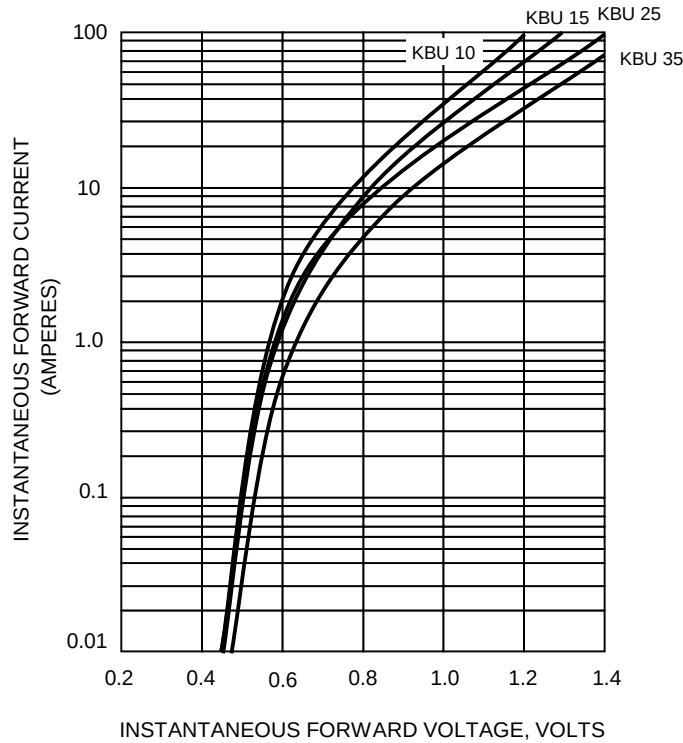


FIG.4– TYPICAL REVERSE CHARACTERISTICS
