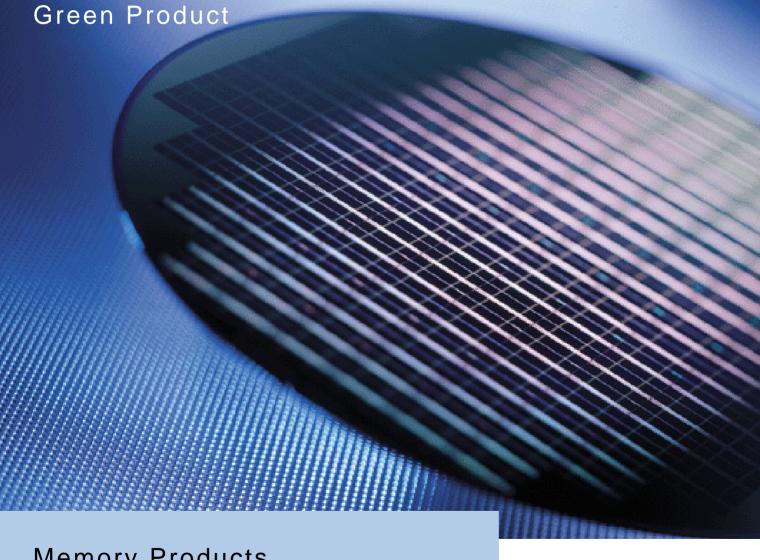

1.2 Description

The 16M x 16 Double Data Rate Graphics DRAM is a high-speed CMOS, dynamic random-access memory containing 268,435,456 bits. It is internally configured as a quad-bank DRAM.

The 16M x 16 Double Data Rate Graphics DRAM uses a double-data-rate architecture to achieve high-speed operation. The double data rate architecture is essentially a 2n prefetch architecture with an interface designed to transfer two data words per clock cycle at the I/O pins. A single read or write access for the 16M x 16 Double Data Rate Graphics DRAM effectively consists of a single 2n-bit wide, one clock cycle data transfer at the internal DRAM core and two corresponding n-bit wide, one-half-clock-cycle data transfers at the I/O pins.

A bidirectional data strobe (DQS) is transmitted externally, along with data, for use in data capture at the receiver. DQS is a strobe transmitted by the DDR SGRAM during Reads and by the memory controller during Writes. DQS is edge-aligned with data for Reads and center-aligned with data for Writes.

The 16M x 16 Double Data Rate Graphics DRAM operates from a differential clock (CK and \overline{CK} ; the crossing of CK going HIGH and \overline{CK} going LOW is referred to as the positive edge of CK). Commands (address and control signals) are registered at every positive edge of CK. Input data is registered on both edges of DQS, and output data is referenced to both edges of DQS, as well as to both edges of CK.

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Overview

Read and write accesses to the DDR SGRAM are burst oriented; accesses start at a selected location and continue for a programmed number of locations in a programmed sequence. Accesses begin with the registration of an Active command, which is then followed by a Read or Write command. The address bits registered coincident with the Active command are used to select the bank and row to be accessed. The address bits registered coincident with the Read or Write command are used to select the bank and the starting column location for the burst access.

The DDR SGRAM provides for programmable Read or Write burst lengths of 2, 4 or 8 locations. An Auto Precharge function may be enabled to provide a self-timed row precharge that is initiated at the end of the burst access.

As with standard SDRAMs, the pipelined, multibank architecture of DDR SGRAMs allows for concurrent operation, thereby providing high effective bandwidth by hiding row precharge and activation time.

An auto refresh mode is provided along with a power-saving power-down mode. All inputs are compatible with the JEDEC Standard for SSTL_2. All outputs are SSTL_2, Class II compatible.

Note: The functionality described and the timing specifications included in this data sheet are for the DLL Enabled mode of operation.

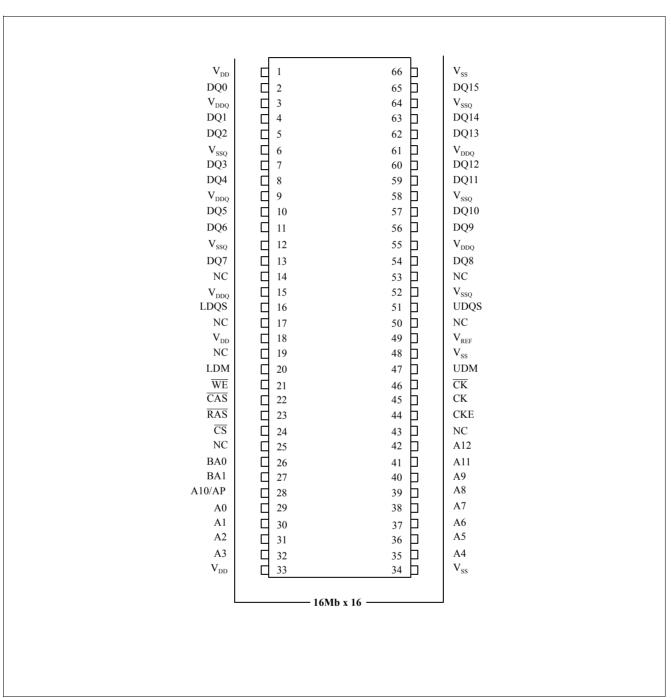


Figure 1 Pin Configuration P-TSOPII-66-1

CK, CK	Input	Clock: CK and $\overline{\text{CK}}$ are differential clock inputs. All address and control input signals are sampled on the crossing of the positive edge of CK and negative edge of $\overline{\text{CK}}$. Output (read) data is referenced to the crossings of CK and $\overline{\text{CK}}$ (both directions of crossing).
CKE	Input	Clock Enable: CKE HIGH activates, and CKE Low deactivates, internal clock signals and device input buffers and output drivers. Taking CKE Low provides Precharge Power-Down and Self Refresh operation (all banks idle), or Active Power-Down (row Active in any bank). 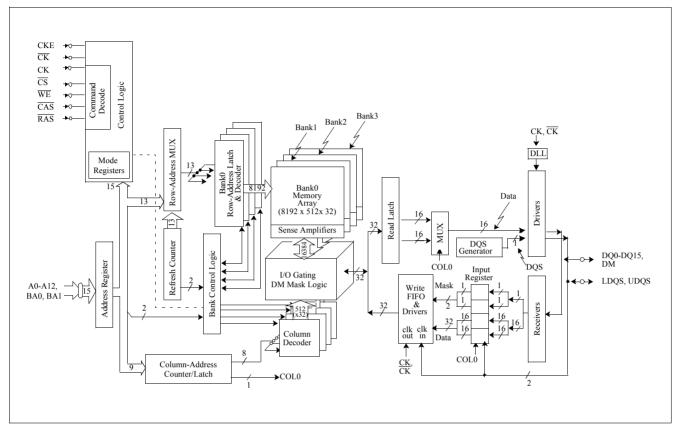


Figure 2 Block Diagram (16 Mbit \times 16)

3 **Functional Description**

The 16M x 16 Double Data Rate Graphics DRAM is a high-speed CMOS, dynamic random-access memory containing 268,435,456 bits. The 16M x 16 Double Data Rate Graphics DRAM is internally configured as a quadbank DRAM.

The 16M x 16 Double Data Rate Graphics DRAM uses a double-data-rate architecture to achieve high-speed operation. The double-data-rate architecture is essentially a 2n prefetch architecture, with an interface designed to transfer two data words per clock cycle at the I/O pins. A single read or write access for the 16M x 16 Double Data Rate Graphics DRAM consists of a single 2n-bit wide, one clock cycle data transfer at the internal DRAM core and two corresponding n-bit wide, one-half clock cycle data transfers at the I/O pins.

Read and write accesses to the DDR SGRAM are burst oriented; accesses start at a selected location and continue for a programmed number of locations in a programmed sequence. Accesses begin with the registration of an Active command, which is then followed by a Read or Write command. The address bits registered coincident with the Active command are used to select the bank and row to be accessed (BA0, BA1 select the bank; A0-A12 select the row). The address bits registered coincident with the Read or Write command are used to select the starting column location for the burst access.

Prior to normal operation, the DDR SGRAM must be initialized. The following sections provide detailed information covering device initialization, register definition, command descriptions and device operation.

3.1 Initialization

DDR SGRAMs must be powered up and initialized in a predefined manner. Operational procedures other than those specified may result in undefined operation. The following criteria must be met:

No power sequencing is specified during power up or power down given the following criteria:

The DQ and DQS outputs are in the High-Z state, where they remain until driven in normal operation (by a read access). After all power supply and reference voltages are stable, and the clock is stable, the DDR SGRAM requires a 200 µs delay prior to applying an executable command.

Once the 200 µs delay has been satisfied, a Deselect or NOP command should be applied, and CKE should be brought HIGH. Following the NOP command, a Precharge ALL command should be applied. Next a Mode Register Set command should be issued for the Extended Mode Register, to enable the DLL, then a Mode Register Set command should be issued for the Mode Register, to reset the DLL, and to program the operating parameters. 200 clock cycles are required between the DLL reset and any executable command. During the 200 cycles of clock for DLL locking, a Deselect or NOP command must be applied. After the 200 clock cycles, a Precharge ALL command should be applied, placing the device in the "all banks idle" state.

Once in the idle state, two AUTO REFRESH cycles must be performed. Additionally, a Mode Register Set command for the Mode Register, with the reset DLL bit deactivated (i.e. to program operating parameters without resetting the DLL) must be performed. Following these cycles, the DDR SGRAM is ready for normal operation.

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Functional Description

3.2 Mode Register Definition

The Mode Register is used to define the specific mode of operation of the DDR SGRAM. This definition includes the selection of a burst length, a burst type, a CAS latency, and an operating mode. The Mode Register is programmed via the Mode Register Set command (with BA0 = 0 and BA1 = 0) and retains the stored information until it is programmed again or the device loses power (except for bit A8, which is self-clearing).

Mode Register bits A0-A2 specify the burst length, A3 specifies the type of burst (sequential or interleaved), A4-A6 specify the CAS latency, and A7-A12 specify the operating mode.

The Mode Register must be loaded when all banks are idle, and the controller must wait the specified time before initiating the subsequent operation. Violating either of these requirements results in unspecified operation.

3.2.1 Burst Length

Read and write accesses to the DDR SGRAM are burst oriented, with the burst length being programmable. The burst length determines the maximum number of column locations that can be accessed for a given Read or Write command. Burst lengths of 2, 4, or 8 locations are available for both the sequential and the interleaved burst types. Reserved states should not be used, as unknown operation or incompatibility with future versions may result.

When a Read or Write command is issued, a block of columns equal to the burst length is effectively selected. All accesses for that burst take place within this block, meaning that the burst wraps within the block if a boundary is reached. The block is uniquely selected by A1-Ai when the burst length is set to two, by A_2 -Ai when the burst length is set to four and by A_3 -Ai when the burst length is set to eight (where Ai is the most significant column address bit

for a given configuration). The remaining (least significant) address bit(s) is (are) used to select the starting location within the block. The programmed burst length applies to both Read and Write bursts.

3.2.2 Burst Type

Accesses within a given burst may be programmed to be either sequential or interleaved; this is referred to as the burst type and is selected via bit A3. The ordering of accesses within a burst is determined by the burst length, the burst type and the starting column address, as shown in **Table 4**.

- 1. For a burst length of two, A1-Ai selects the two-data-element block; A0 selects the first access within the block.
- 2. For a burst length of four, A2-Ai selects the four-data-element block; A0-A1 selects the first access within the block.

3.2.3 Read Latency

The Read latency, or CAS latency, is the delay, in clock cycles, between the registration of a Read command and the availability of the first burst of output data. The latency can be programmed 2, 2.5 and 3 clocks. CAS latency of 1.5 is supported for DDR200 components only.

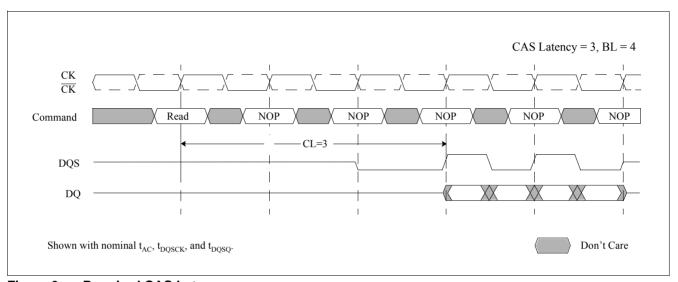


Figure 3 Required CAS Latency

If a Read command is registered at clock edge n, and the latency is m clocks, the data is available nominally coincident with clock edge n + m (see Figure 3)

Reserved states should not be used as unknown operation or incompatibility with future versions may result.

3.2.4 Operating Mode

The normal operating mode is selected by issuing a Mode Register Set Command with bits A7-A12 set to zero, and bits A0-A6 set to the desired values. A DLL reset is initiated by issuing a Mode Register Set command with bits A7 and A9-A12 each set to zero, bit A8 set to one, and bits A0-A6 set to the desired values. A Mode Register Set command issued to reset the DLL should always be followed by a Mode Register Set command to select normal operating mode.

All other combinations of values for A7-A12 are reserved for future use and/or test modes. Test modes and reserved states should not be used as unknown operation or incompatibility with future versions may result.

3.3 Extended Mode Register

The Extended Mode Register controls functions beyond those controlled by the Mode Register; these additional functions include DLL enable/disable, and output drive strength selection (optional). These functions are controlled via the bits shown in the Extended Mode Register Definition. The Extended Mode Register is programmed via the Mode Register Set command (with BA0 = 1 and BA1 = 0) and retains the stored information until it is programmed again or the device loses power. The Extended Mode Register must be loaded when all banks are idle, and the controller must wait the specified time before initiating any subsequent operation. Violating either of these requirements result in unspecified operation.

3.3.1 DLL Enable/Disable

The DLL must be enabled for normal operation. DLL enable is required during power up initialization, and upon returning to normal operation after having disabled the DLL for the purpose of debug or evaluation. The DLL is automatically disabled when entering self refresh operation and is automatically re-enabled upon exit of self refresh operation. Any time the DLL is enabled, 200 clock cycles must occur before a Read command can be issued. This is the reason 200 clock cycles must occur before issuing a Read or Write command upon exit of self refresh operation.

3.3.2 Output Drive Strength

The normal drive strength for all outputs is specified to be SSTL_2, Class II. In addition this design version supports a weak driver mode for lighter load and/or point-to-point environments which can be activated during mode register set. *I-V* curves for the normal and weak drive strength are included in this document.

3.4 Commands

Deselect

The Deselect function prevents new commands from being executed by the DDR SGRAM. The DDR SGRAM is effectively deselected. Operations already in progress are not affected.

No Operation (NOP)

The No Operation (NOP) command is used to perform a NOP to a DDR SGRAM. This prevents unwanted commands from being registered during idle or wait states. Operations already in progress are not affected.

Mode Register Set

The mode registers are loaded via inputs A0-A12, BA0 and BA1. See mode register descriptions in **Chapter 3.2**. The Mode Register Set command can only be issued when all banks are idle and no bursts are in progress. A subsequent executable command cannot be issued until t_{MRD} is met.

Active

The Active command is used to open (or activate) a row in a particular bank for a subsequent access. The value on the BA0, BA1 inputs selects the bank, and the address provided on inputs A0-A12 selects the row. This row remains active (or open) for accesses until a Precharge (or Read or Write with Auto Precharge) is issued to that bank. A Precharge (or Read or Write with Auto Precharge) command must be issued and completed before opening a different row in the same bank.

Read

The Read command is used to initiate a burst read access to an active (open) row. The value on the BA0, BA1 inputs selects the bank, and the address provided on inputs A0-A8 selects the starting column location. The value on input A10 determines whether or not Auto Precharge is used. If Auto Precharge is selected, the row being accessed is precharged at the end of the Read burst; if Auto Precharge is not selected, the row remains open for subsequent accesses.

Write

The Write command is used to initiate a burst write access to an active (open) row. The value on the BA0, BA1 inputs selects the bank, and the address provided on inputs A0-A8 selects the starting column location. The value on input A10 determines whether or not Auto Precharge is used. If Auto Precharge is selected, the row being accessed is precharged at the end of the Write burst; if Auto Precharge is not selected, the row remains open for subsequent accesses. Input data appearing on the DQs is written to the memory array subject to the DM input logic level appearing coincident with the data. If a given DM signal is registered low, the corresponding data is written to memory; if the DM signal is registered high, the corresponding data inputs are ignored, and a Write is not executed to that byte/column location.

Precharge

The Precharge command is used to deactivate (close) the open row in a particular bank or the open row(s) in all banks. The bank(s) will be available for a subsequent row access a specified time (t_{RP}) after the Precharge command is issued. Input A10 determines whether one or all banks are to be precharged, and in the case where only one bank is to be precharged, inputs BA0, BA1 select the bank. Otherwise BA0, BA1 are treated as "Don't Care". Once a bank has been precharged, it is in the idle state and must be activated prior to any Read or Write commands being issued to that bank. A precharge command is treated as a NOP if there is no open row in that bank, or if the previously open row is already in the process of precharging.

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Functional Description

Auto Precharge

Auto Precharge is a feature which performs the same individual-bank precharge functions described above, but without requiring an explicit command. This is accomplished by using A10 to enable Auto Precharge in conjunction with a specific Read or Write command. A precharge of the bank/row that is addressed with the Read or Write command is automatically performed upon completion of the Read or Write burst. Auto Precharge is nonpersistent in that it is either enabled or disabled for each individual Read or Write command. Auto Precharge ensures that the precharge is initiated at the earliest valid stage within a burst. The user must not issue another command to the same bank until the precharge (t_{RP}) is completed. This is determined as if an explicit Precharge command was issued at the earliest possible time, as described for each burst type in **Chapter 3.5**.

Burst Terminate

The Burst Terminate command is used to truncate read bursts (with Auto Precharge disabled). The most recently registered Read command prior to the Burst Terminate command is truncated, as shown in **Chapter 3.5**.

Auto Refresh

Auto Refresh is used during normal operation of the DDR SGRAM and is analogous to \overline{CAS} Before \overline{RAS} (CBR) Refresh in previous DRAM types. This command is nonpersistent, so it must be issued each time a refresh is required.

The refresh addressing is generated by the internal refresh controller. This makes the address bits "Don't Care" during an Auto Refresh command. The 16M x 16 Double Data Rate Graphics DRAM requires Auto Refresh cycles at an average periodic interval of 7.8 µs (maximum).

To allow for improved efficiency in scheduling and switching between tasks, some flexibility in the absolute refresh interval is provided. A maximum of eight Auto Refresh commands can be posted in the system, meaning that the maximum absolute interval between any Auto Refresh command and the next Auto Refresh command is $9 \times 7.8 \,\mu s$ (70.2 μs). This maximum absolute interval is short enough to allow for DLL updates internal to the DDR SGRAM to be restricted to Auto Refresh cycles, without allowing too much drift in t_{AC} between updates.

Self Refresh

The Self Refresh command can be used to retain data in the DDR SGRAM, even if the rest of the system is powered down. When in the self refresh mode, the DDR SGRAM retains data without external clocking. The Self Refresh command is initiated as an Auto Refresh command coincident with CKE transitioning low. The DLL is automatically disabled upon entering Self Refresh, and is automatically enabled upon exiting Self Refresh (200 clock cycles must then occur before a Read command can be issued). Input signals except CKE (low) are "Don't Care" during Self Refresh operation.

The procedure for exiting self refresh requires a sequence of commands. CK (and $\overline{\text{CK}}$) must be stable prior to CKE returning high. Once CKE is high, the SDRAM must have NOP commands issued for t_{XSNR} because time is required for the completion of any internal refresh in progress. A simple algorithm for meeting both refresh and DLL requirements is to apply NOPs for 200 clock cycles before applying any other command.

3.5 Operations

3.5.1 Bank/Row Activation

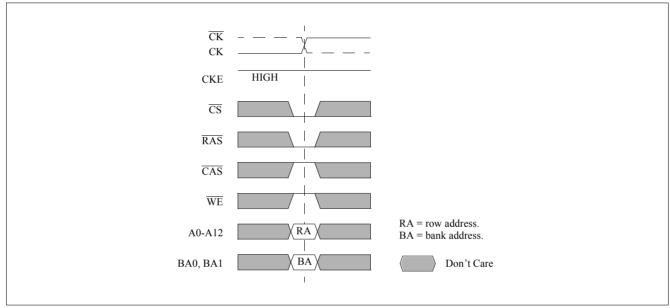


Figure 4 Activating a Specific Row in a Specific Bank

Before any Read or Write commands can be issued to a bank within the DDR SGRAM, a row in that bank must be "opened" (activated). This is accomplished via the Active command and addresses A0-A12, BA0 and BA1 (see Figure 4), which decode and select both the bank and the row to be activated. After opening a row (issuing an Active command), a Read or Write command may be issued to that row, subject to the $t_{\rm RCD}$ specification. A subsequent Active command to a different row in the same bank can only be issued after the previous active row has been "closed" (precharged). The minimum time interval between successive Active commands to the same bank is defined by $t_{\rm RC}$. A subsequent Active command to another bank can be issued while the first bank is being accessed, which results in a reduction of total row-access overhead. The minimum time interval between successive Active commands to different banks is defined by $t_{\rm RRD}$.

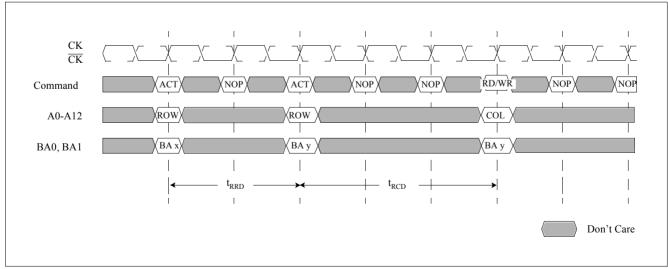


Figure 5 t_{RCD} and t_{RRD} Definition

3.5.2 Reads

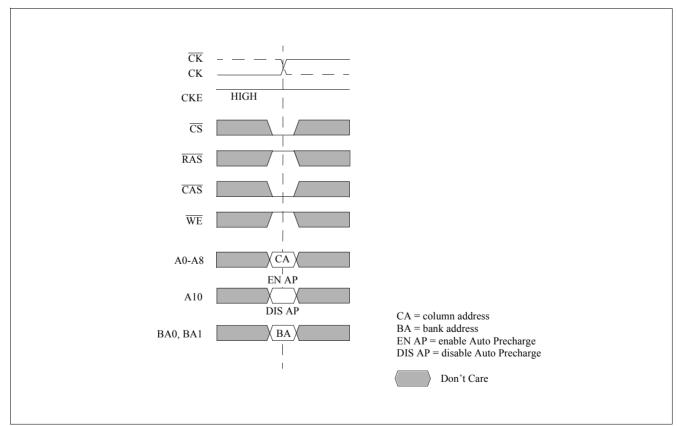


Figure 6 Read Command

Subsequent to programming the mode register with CAS latency, burst type, and burst length, Read bursts are initiated with a Read command, as shown on **Figure 6**.

The starting column and bank addresses are provided with the Read command and Auto Precharge is either enabled or disabled for that burst access. If Auto Precharge is enabled, the row that is accessed starts precharge at the completion of the burst, provided $t_{\rm RAS}$ has been satisfied. For the generic Read commands used in the following illustrations, Auto Precharge is disabled.

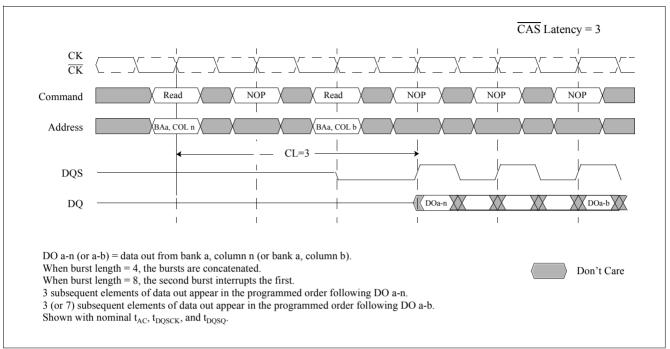


Figure 7 Consecutive Read Bursts (Burst Length = 4)

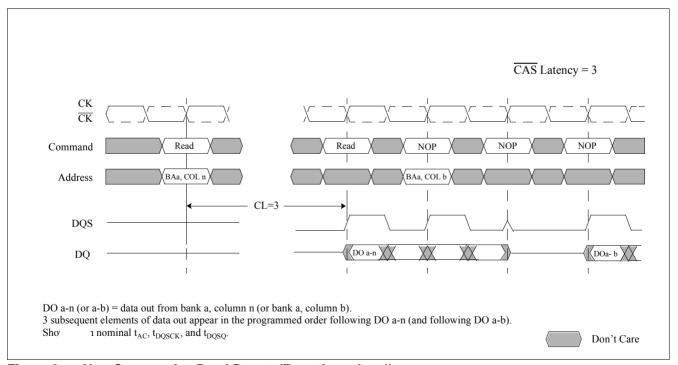


Figure 8 Non-Consecutive Read Bursts (Burst Length = 4)

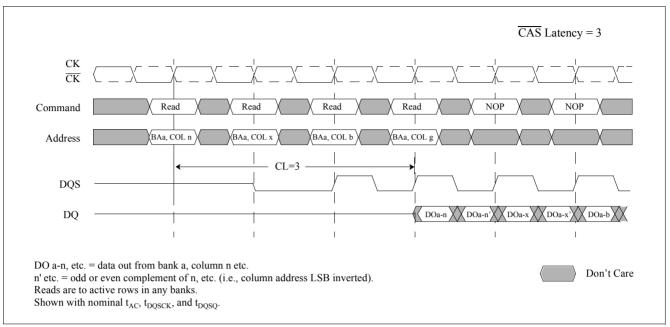


Figure 9 Random Read Accesses (Burst Length = 2, 4 or 8)

During Read bursts, the valid data-out element from the starting column address is available following the CAS latency after the Read command. Each subsequent data-out element is valid nominally at the next positive or negative clock edge (i.e. at the next crossing of CK and $\overline{\text{CK}}$). (**Figure 10**) shows general timing for each supported CAS latency setting. DQS is driven by the DDR SGRAM along with output data. The initial low state on DQS is known as the read preamble; the low state coincident with the last data-out element is known as the read postamble. Upon completion of a burst, assuming no other commands have been initiated, the DQs goes High-Z. Data from any Read burst may be concatenated with or truncated with data from a subsequent Read command. In either case, a continuous flow of data can be maintained. The first data element from the new burst follows either the last element of a completed burst or the last desired data element of a longer burst which is being truncated. The new Read command should be issued x cycles after the first Read command, where x equals the number of desired data element pairs (pairs are required by the 2n prefetch architecture). This is shown on **Figure 7**. A Read command can be initiated on any clock cycle following a previous Read command. Nonconsecutive Read data is illustrated on **Figure 8**. Full-speed Random Read Accesses: CAS Latencies (Burst Length = 2, 4 or 8) within a page (or pages) can be performed as shown on **Figure 9**.

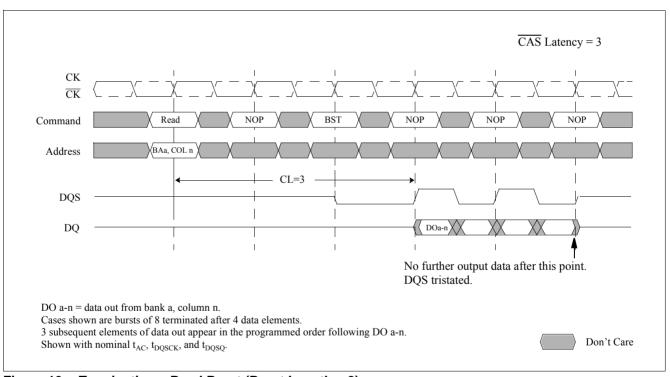


Figure 10 Terminating a Read Burst (Burst Length = 8)

Data from any Read burst may be truncated with a Burst Terminate command, as shown on **Figure 10**. The Burst Terminate latency is equal to the read (CAS) latency, i.e. the Burst Terminate command should be issued x cycles after the Read command, where x equals the number of desired data element pairs.

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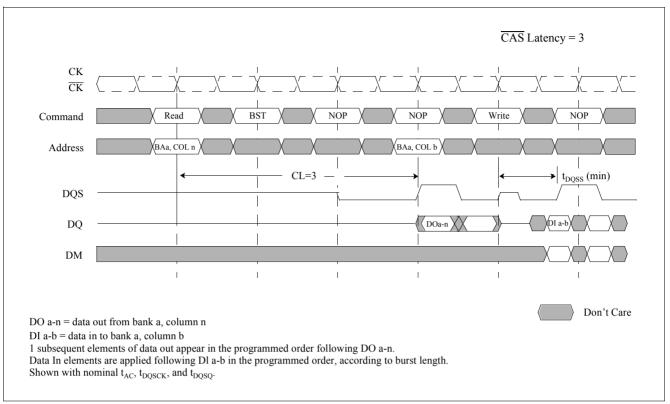


Figure 11 Read to Write (Burst Length = 4 or 8)

Data from any Read burst must be completed or truncated before a subsequent Write command can be issued. If truncation is necessary, the Burst Terminate command must be used, as shown on **Figure 11**. The example is shown for $t_{DQSS(min)}$. The $t_{DQSS(max)}$ case, not shown here, has a longer bus idle time. $t_{DQSS(min)}$ and $t_{DQSS(max)}$ are defined in **Chapter 3.5.3**.

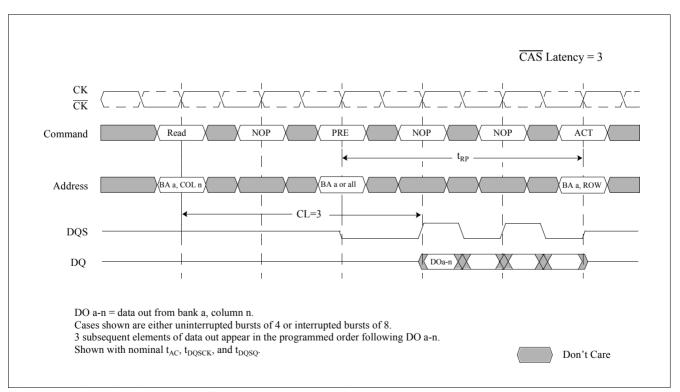


Figure 12 Read to Precharge (Burst Length = 4 or 8)

A Read burst may be followed by, or truncated with, a Precharge command to the same bank (provided that Auto Precharge was not activated). The Precharge command should be issued x cycles after the Read command, where x equals the number of desired data element pairs (pairs are required by the 2n prefetch architecture). This is shown on **Figure 12** for Read latencies of 2 and 2.5. Following the Precharge command, a subsequent command to the same bank cannot be issued until $t_{\rm RP}$ is met. Note that part of the row precharge time is hidden during the access of the last data elements.

In the case of a Read being executed to completion, a Precharge command issued at the optimum time (as described above) provides the same operation that would result from the same Read burst with Auto Precharge enabled. The disadvantage of the Precharge command is that it requires that the command and address busses be available at the appropriate time to issue the command. The advantage of the Precharge command is that it can be used to truncate bursts.

3.5.3 Writes

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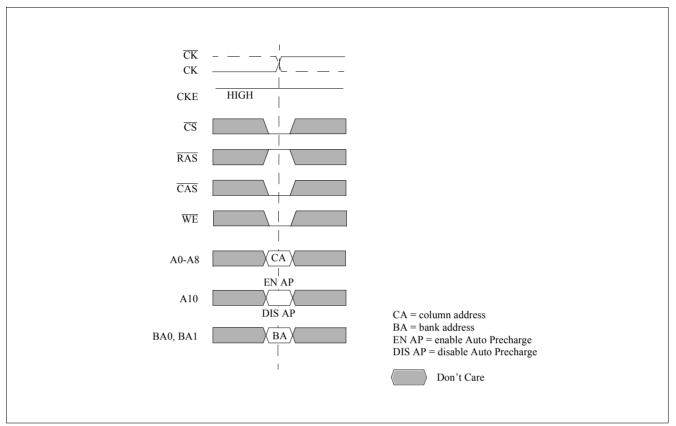


Figure 13 Write Command

Write bursts are initiated with a Write command, as shown in Figure 13.

The starting column and bank addresses are provided with the Write command, and Auto Precharge is either enabled or disabled for that access. If Auto Precharge is enabled, the row being accessed is precharged at the completion of the burst. For the generic Write commands used in the following illustrations, Auto Precharge is disabled.

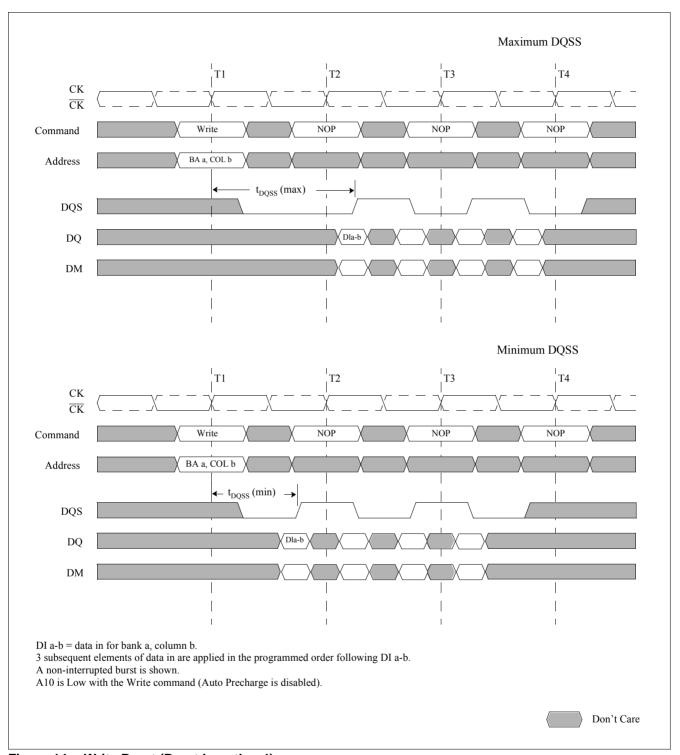


Figure 14 Write Burst (Burst Length = 4)

During Write bursts, the first valid data-in element is registered on the first rising edge of DQS following the write command, and subsequent data elements are registered on successive edges of DQS. The Low state on DQS between the Write command and the first rising edge is known as the write preamble; the Low state on DQS following the last data-in element is known as the write postamble. The time between the Write command and the first corresponding rising edge of DQS (t_{DQSS}) is specified with a relatively wide range (from 75% to 125% of one clock cycle), so most of the Write diagrams that follow are drawn for the two extreme cases (i.e. $t_{DQSS(min)}$) and $t_{DQSS(max)}$). Figure 14 shows the two extremes of t_{DQSS} for a burst of four. Upon completion of a burst, assuming no other commands have been initiated, the DQs and DQS enters High-Z and any additional input data is ignored.

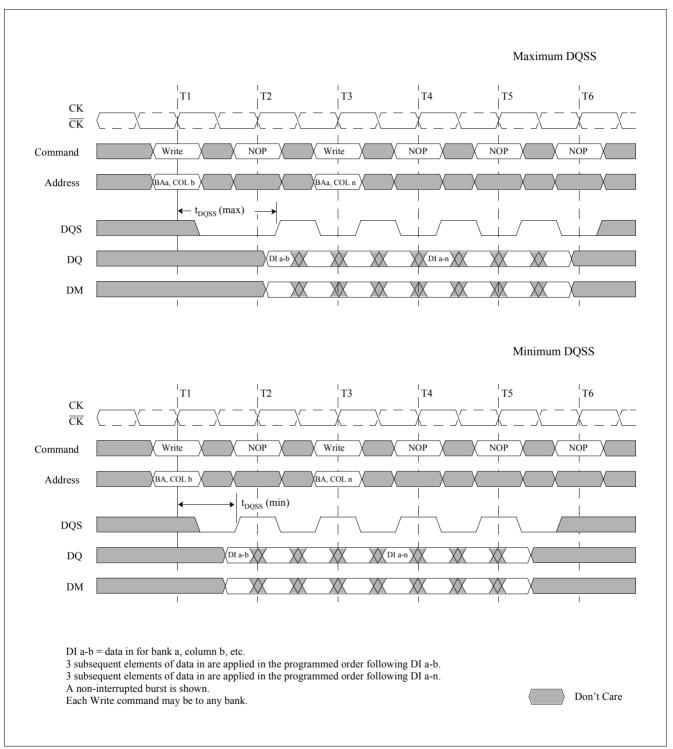


Figure 15 Write to Write (Burst Length = 4)



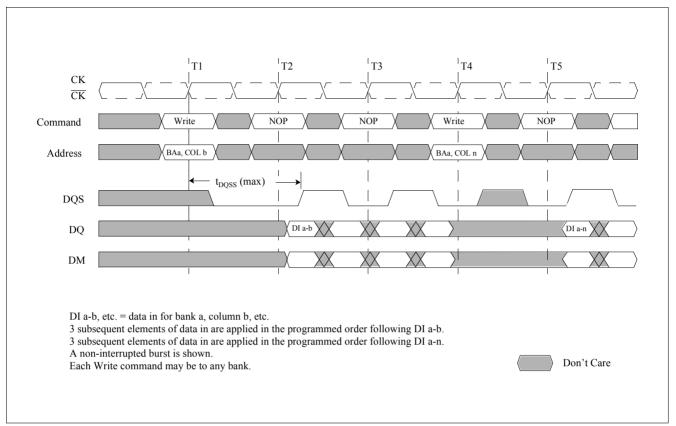


Figure 16 Write to Write: Max. DQSS, Non-Consecutive (Burst Length = 4)

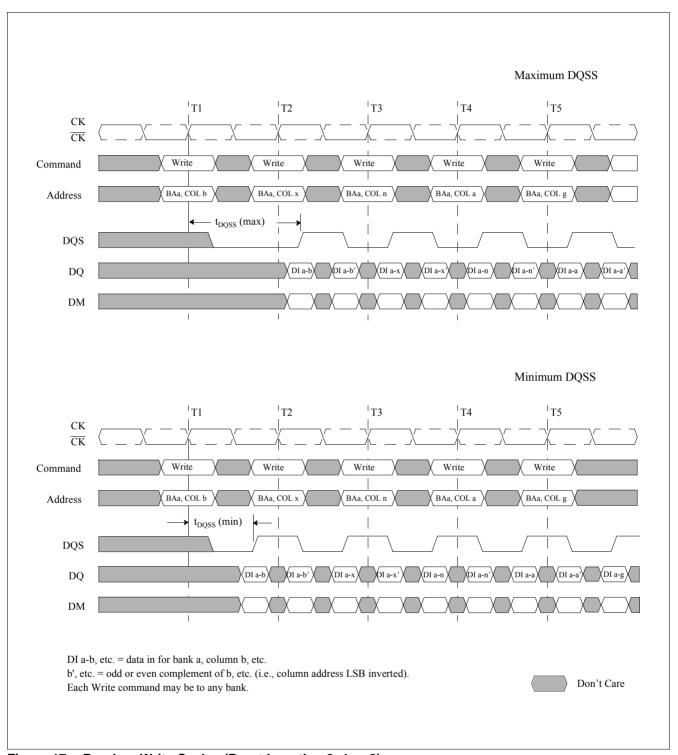


Figure 17 Random Write Cycles (Burst Length = 2, 4 or 8)

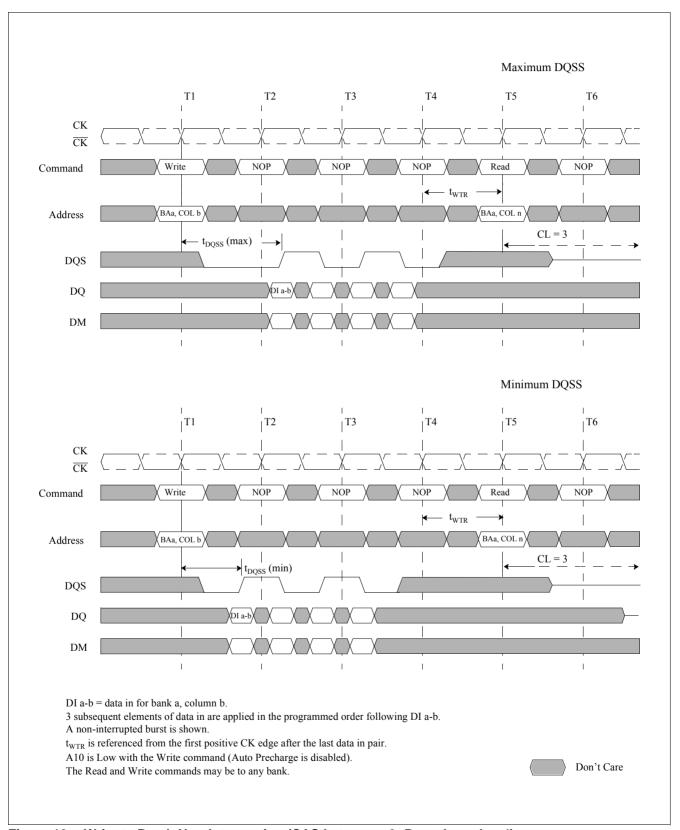


Figure 18 Write to Read: Non-Interrupting (CAS Latency = 3; Burst Length = 4)

Data for any Write burst may be concatenated with or truncated with a subsequent Write command. In either case, a continuous flow of input data can be maintained. The new Write command can be issued on any positive edge of clock following the previous Write command. The first data element from the new burst is applied after either the last element of a completed burst or the last desired data element of a longer burst which is being truncated. The new Write command should be issued x cycles after the first Write command, where x equals the number of desired data element pairs (pairs are required by the 2n prefetch architecture). **Figure 15** shows concatenated bursts of 4. An example of non-consecutive Writes is shown in **Figure 16**. Full-speed random write accesses within a page or pages can be performed as shown in **Figure 17**. Data for any Write burst may be followed by a subsequent Read command. To follow a Write without truncating the write burst, $t_{\rm WTR}$ (Write to Read) should be met as shown in **Figure 18**.

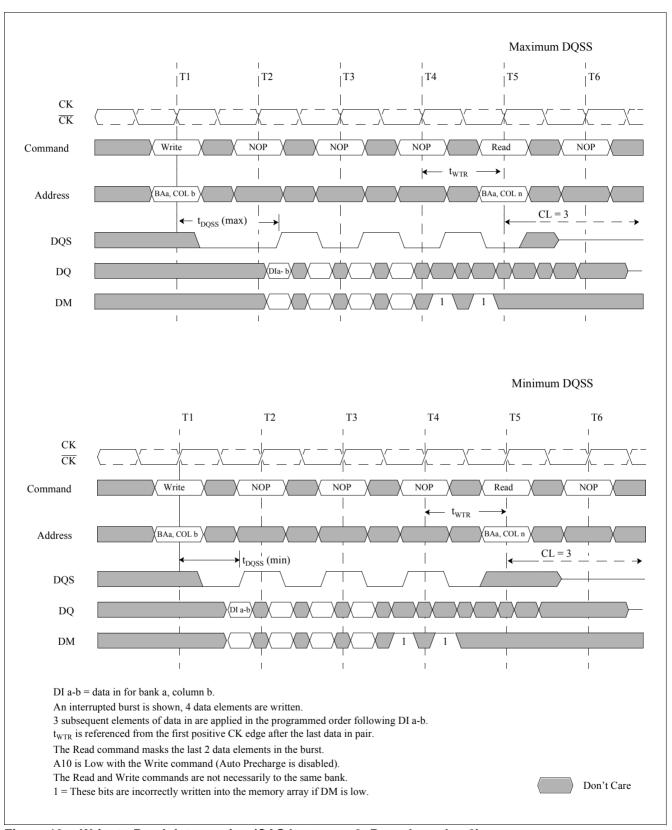


Figure 19 Write to Read: Interrupting (CAS Latency = 3; Burst Length = 8)

Data for any Write burst may be truncated by a subsequent Read command, as shown in **Figure 19** to **Figure 21**. Note that only the data-in pairs that are registered prior to the t_{WTR} period are written to the internal array, and any subsequent data-in must be masked with DM, as shown in the diagrams noted previously.

Data for any Write burst may be followed by a subsequent Precharge command. To follow a Write without truncating the write burst, t_{WR} should be met as shown in **Figure 22**.

Data for any Write burst may be truncated by a subsequent Precharge command, as shown in **Figure 23** to **Figure 25**. Note that only the data-in pairs that are registered prior to the $t_{\rm WR}$ period are written to the internal array, and any subsequent data in should be masked with DM. Following the Precharge command, a subsequent command to the same bank cannot be issued until $t_{\rm RP}$ is met.

In the case of a Write burst being executed to completion, a Precharge command issued at the optimum time (as described above) provides the same operation that would result from the same burst with Auto Precharge. The disadvantage of the Precharge command is that it requires that the command and address busses be available at the appropriate time to issue the command. The advantage of the Precharge command is that it can be used to truncate bursts.

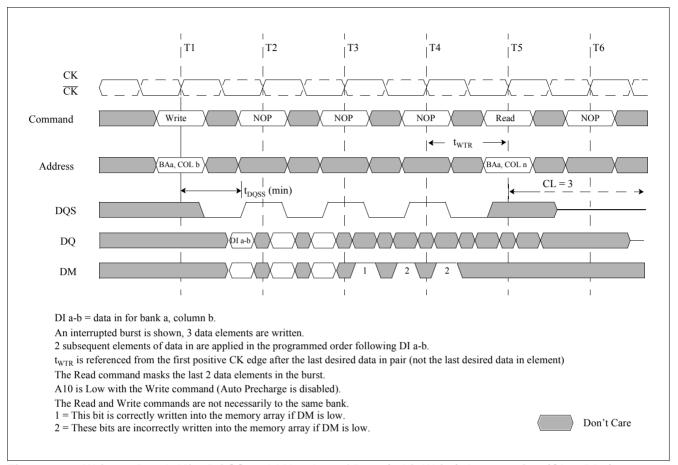


Figure 20 Write to Read: Min. DQSS, Odd Number of Data (3-bit Write), Interrupting (CL3; BL8)



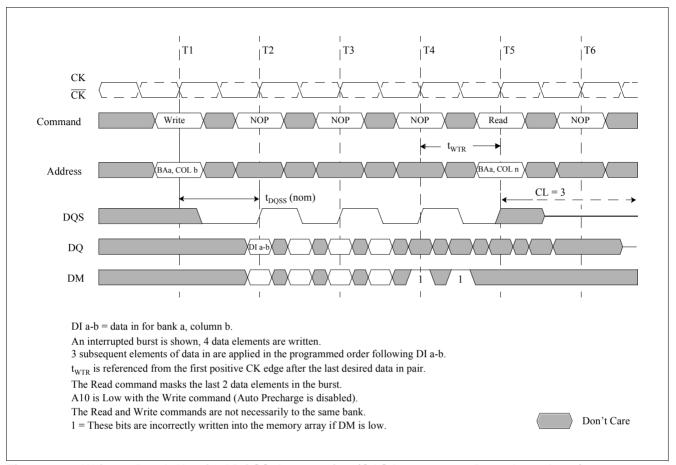


Figure 21 Write to Read: Nominal DQSS, Interrupting (CAS Latency = 3; Burst Length = 8)

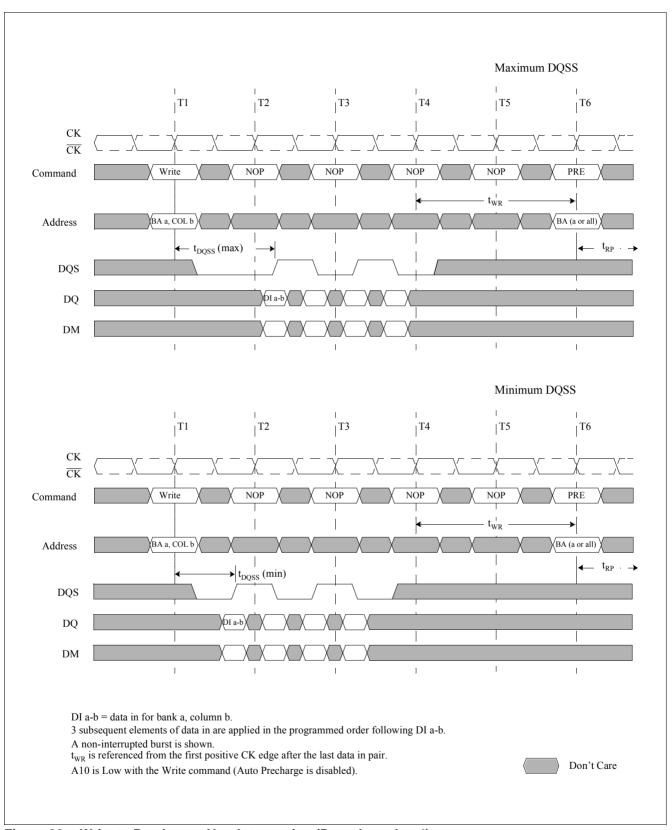


Figure 22 Write to Precharge: Non-Interrupting (Burst Length = 4)

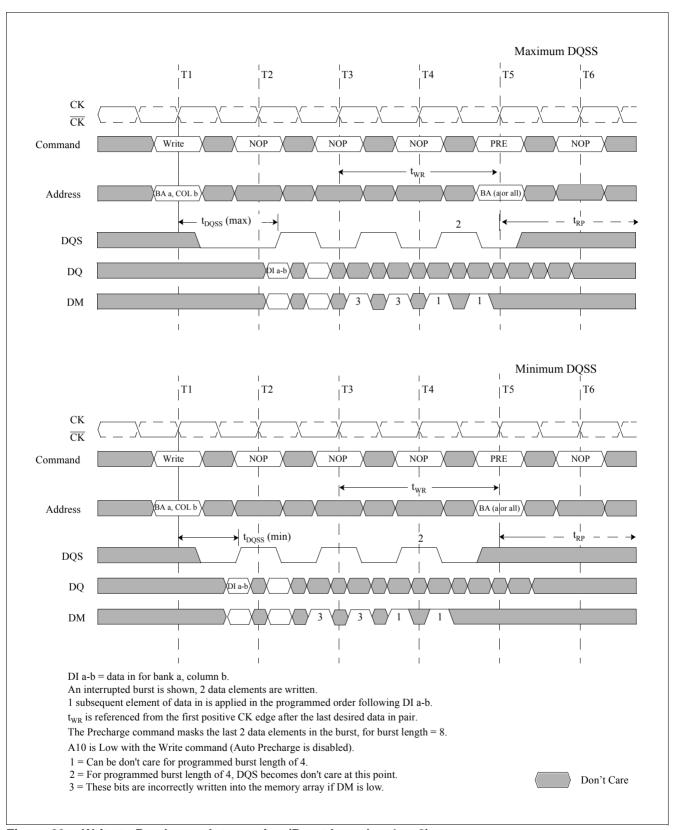


Figure 23 Write to Precharge: Interrupting (Burst Length = 4 or 8)



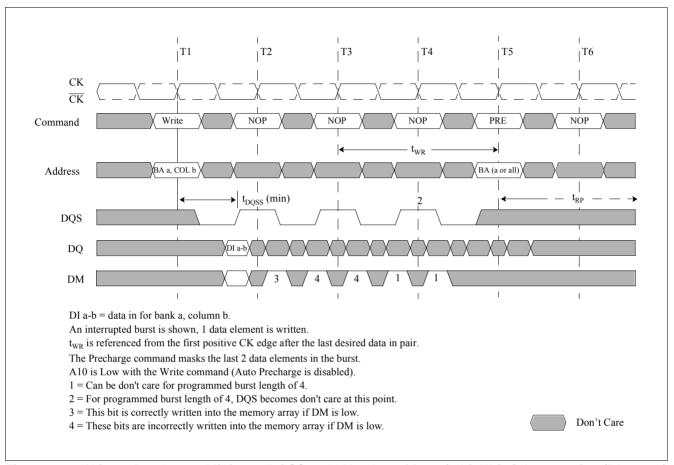


Figure 24 Write to Precharge: Minimum DQSS, Odd Number of Data (1-bit Write), Interrupting (BL 4 or 8)



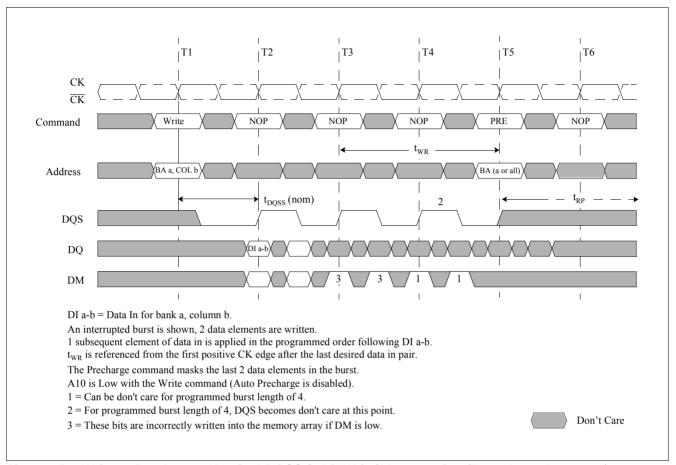


Figure 25 Write to Precharge: Nominal DQSS (2-bit Write), Interrupting (Burst Length = 4 or 8)

3.5.4 Precharge

The Precharge command is used to deactivate the open row in a particular bank or the open row in all banks. The bank(s) will be available for a subsequent row access some specified time ($t_{\rm RP}$) after the Precharge command is issued. Input A10 determines whether one or all banks are to be precharged, and in the case where only one bank is to be precharged, inputs BA0, BA1 select the bank. When all banks are to be precharged, inputs BA0, BA1 are treated as "Don't Care". Once a bank has been precharged, it is in the idle state and must be activated prior to any Read or Write commands being issued to that bank.

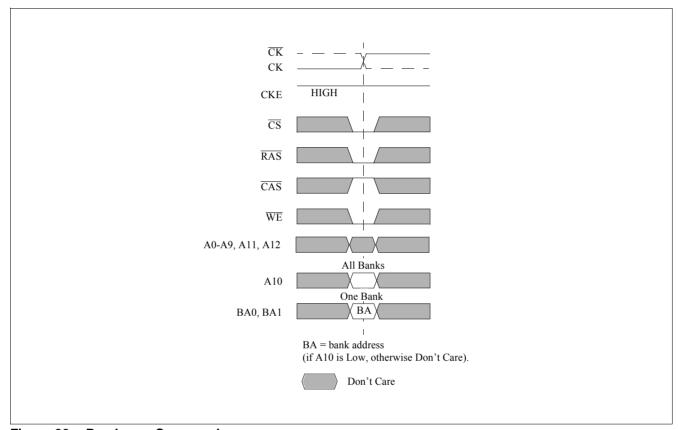


Figure 26 Precharge Command

3.5.5 Power-Down

Power-down is entered when CKE is registered LOW (no accesses can be in progress). If power-down occurs when all banks are idle, this mode is referred to as precharge power-down; if power-down occurs when there is a row active in any bank, this mode is referred to as active power-down. Entering power-down deactivates the input and output buffers, excluding CK, $\overline{\text{CK}}$ and CKE. The DLL is still running in Power Down mode, so for maximum power savings, the user has the option of disabling the DLL prior to entering Power-down. In that case, the DLL must be enabled after exiting power-down, and 200 clock cycles must occur before a Read command can be issued. In power-down mode, CKE Low and a stable clock signal must be maintained at the inputs of the DDR SGRAM, and all other input signals are "Don't Care". However, power-down duration is limited by the refresh requirements of the device, so in most applications, the self refresh mode is preferred over the DLL-disabled power-down mode.

The power-down state is synchronously exited when CKE is registered HIGH (along with a NOP or Deselect command). A valid, executable command may be applied one clock cycle later.

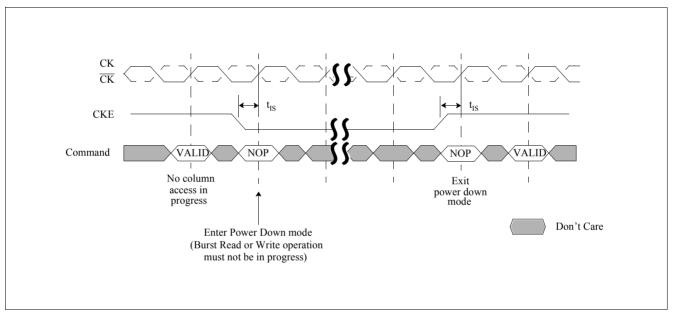


Figure 27 Power Down

3) Current state definitions:

Idle: The bank has been precharged, and t_{RP} has been met.

Row Active: A row in the bank has been activated, and t_{RCD} has been met. No data bursts/accesses and no register accesses are in progress.

Read: A Read burst has been initiated, with Auto Precharge disabled, and has not yet terminated or been terminated. Write: A Write burst has been initiated, with Auto Precharge disabled, and has not yet terminated or been terminated.

4) The following states must not be interrupted by a command issued to the same bank.

Precharging: Starts with registration of a Precharge command and ends when t_{RP} is met. Once t_{RP} is met, the bank is in the idle state.

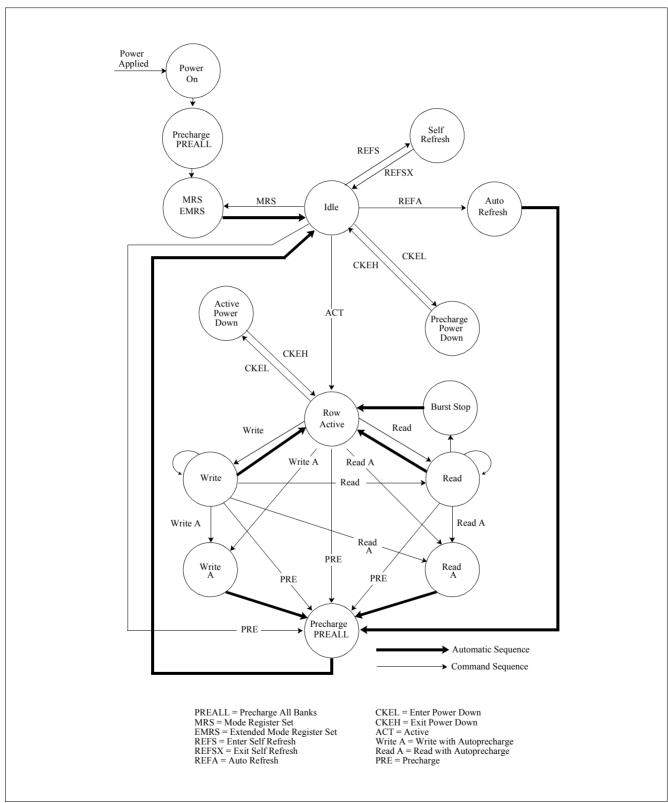


Figure 28 Simplified State Diagram

4.2 Normal Strength Pull-down and Pull-up Characteristics

- 3. The nominal pull-up V-I curve for DDR SDRAM devices is expected, but not guaranteed, to lie within the inner bounding lines of the V-I curve.
- 4. The full variation in driver pull-up current from minimum to maximum process, temperature, and voltage lie within the outer bounding lines of the *V-I* curve.
- 5. The full variation in the ratio of the maximum to minimum pull-up and pull-down current does not exceed 1.7, for device drain to source voltages from 0.1 to 1.0.
- 6. The full variation in the ratio of the nominal pull-up to pull-down current should be unity ±10%, for device drain to source voltages from 0.1 to 1.0 V.

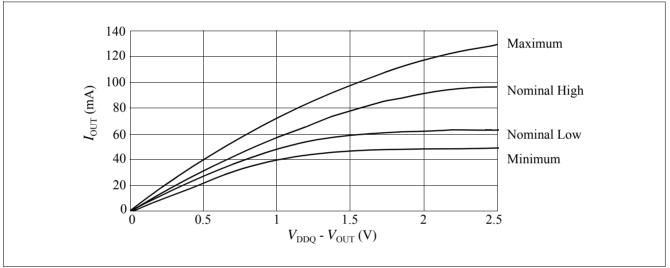
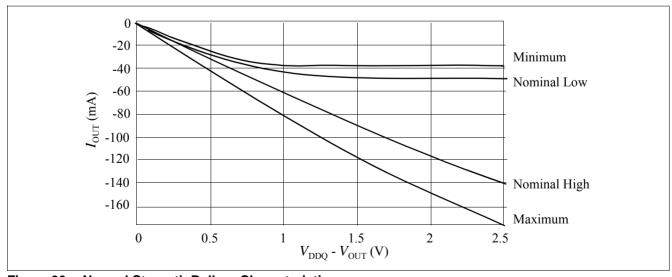


Figure 29 **Normal Strength Pull-down Characteristics**

- 3. The full variation in driver pull-up current from minimum to maximum process, temperature, and voltage lie within the outer bounding lines of the *V-I* curve.
- 4. The full variation in the ratio of the maximum to minimum pull-up and pull-down current does not exceed 1.7, for device drain to source voltages from 0.1 to 1.0.
- 5. The full variation in the ratio of the nominal pull-up to pull-down current should be unity $\pm 10\%$, for device drain to source voltages from 0.1 to 1.0 V.

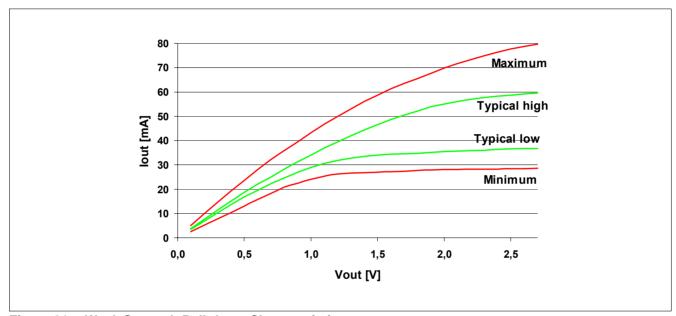


Figure 31 Weak Strength Pull-down Characteristics

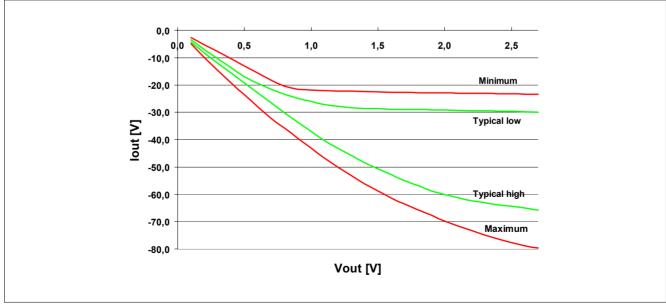


Figure 32 Weak Strength Pull-up Characteristics

4.4 AC Characteristics

(Notes 1-5 apply to the following Tables; Electrical Characteristics and DC Operating Conditions, AC Operating Conditions, $I_{\rm DD}$ Specifications and Conditions, and Electrical Characteristics and AC Timing.)

Notes

- 1. All voltages referenced to $V_{\rm SS}$.
- 2. Tests for AC timing, I_{DD} , and electrical, AC and DC characteristics, may be conducted at nominal reference/supply voltage levels, but the related specifications and device operation are guaranteed for the full voltage range specified.

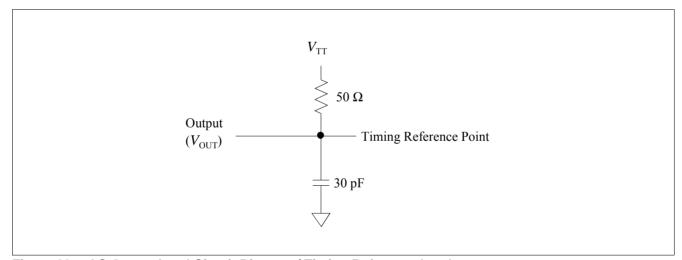


Figure 33 AC Output Load Circuit Diagram / Timing Reference Load

- 3. Figure 33 represents the timing reference load used in defining the relevant timing parameters of the part. It is not intended to be either a precise representation of the typical system environment nor a depiction of the actual load presented by a production tester. System designers will use IBIS or other simulation tools to correlate the timing reference load to a system environment. Manufacturers will correlate to their production test conditions (generally a coaxial transmission line terminated at the tester electronics).
- 4. AC timing and I_{DD} tests may use a V_{IL} to V_{IH} swing of \underline{up} to 1.5 V in the test environment, but input timing is still referenced to V_{REF} (or to the crossing point for CK, \overline{CK}), and parameter specifications are guaranteed for the specified AC input levels under normal use conditions. The minimum slew rate for the input signals is 1 V/ns in the range between $V_{IL(AC)}$ and $V_{IH(AC)}$.
- 5. The AC and DC input level specifications are as defined in the SSTL_2 Standard (i.e. the receiver effectively switches as a result of the signal crossing the AC input level, and remains in that state as long as the signal does not ring back above (below) the DC input LOW (HIGH) level).
- 6. For System Characteristics like Setup & Holdtime Derating for Slew Rate, I/O Delta Rise/Fall Derating, DDR SDRAM Slew Rate Standards, Overshoot & Undershoot specification and Clamp V-I characteristics see the latest JEDEC specification for DDR components.

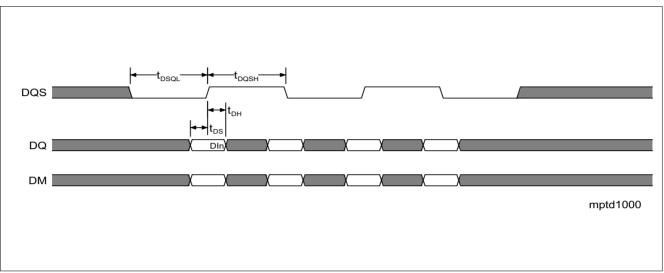


Figure 34 Data Input (Write), Timing Burst Length = 4

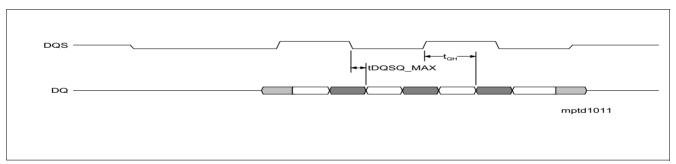


Figure 35 Data Output (Read), Timing Burst Length = 4

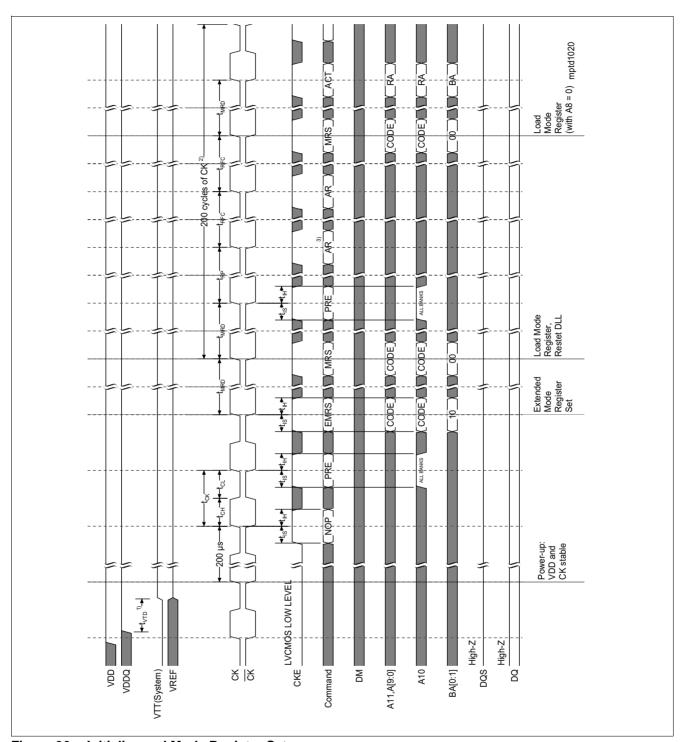


Figure 36 Initialize and Mode Register Sets

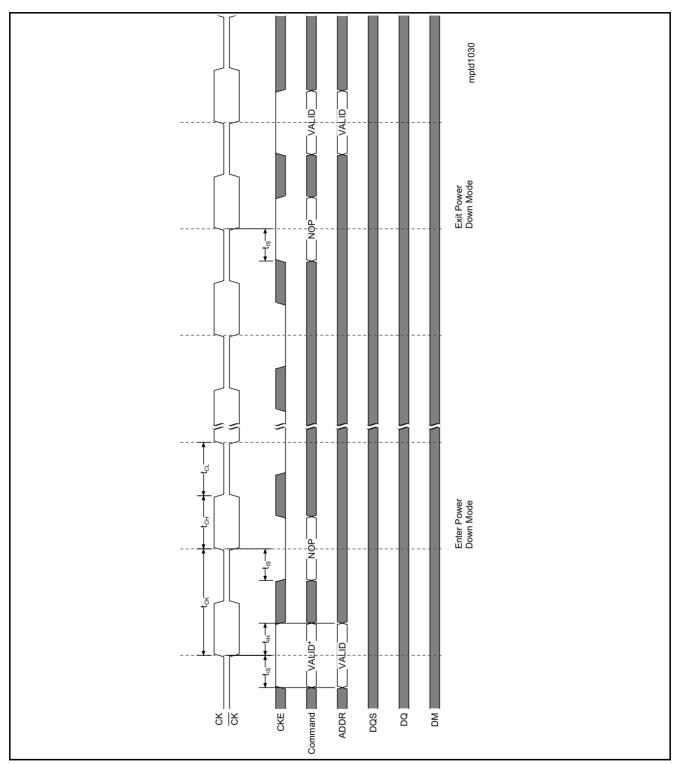


Figure 37 Power Down Mode

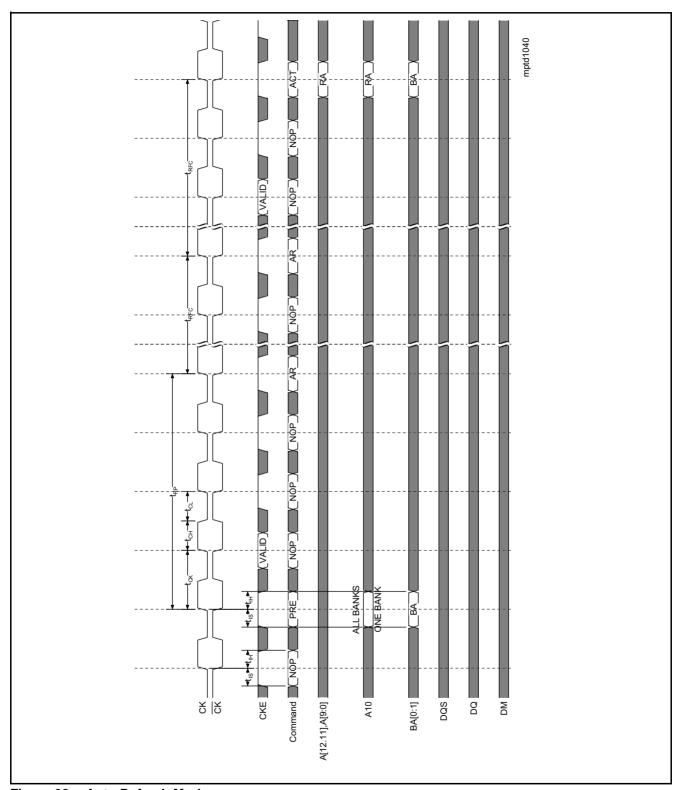


Figure 38 Auto Refresh Mode

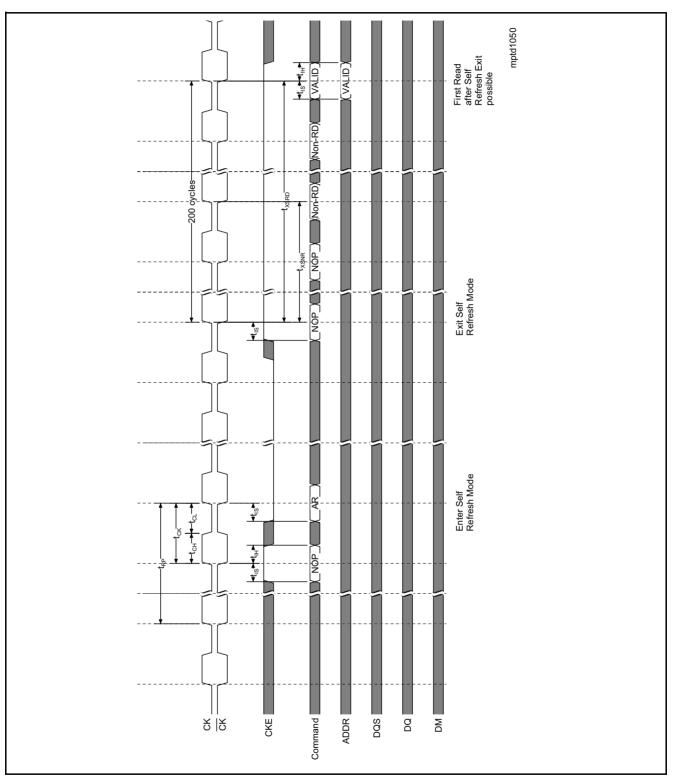


Figure 39 Self Refresh Mode

- 3. The Timing reference is shown with respect to Vref-Crossing.



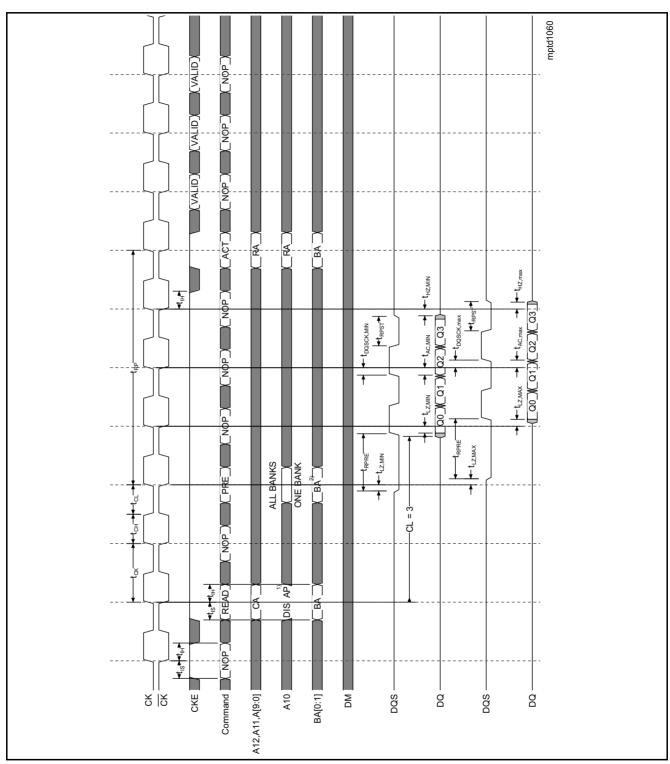


Figure 40 Read without Auto Precharge (Burst Length = 4)

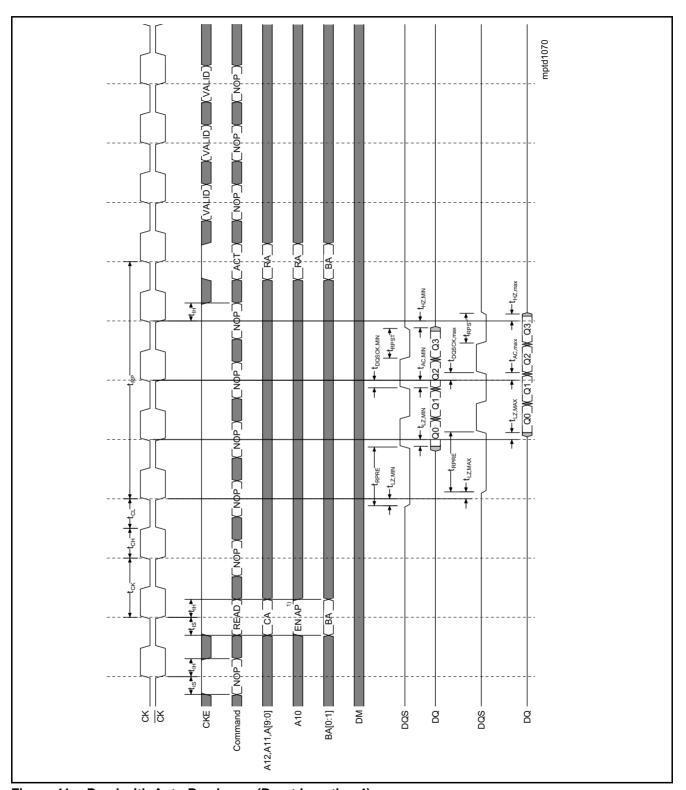


Figure 41 Read with Auto Precharge (Burst Length = 4)

- 4. The Timing reference is shown with respect to Vref-Crossing.



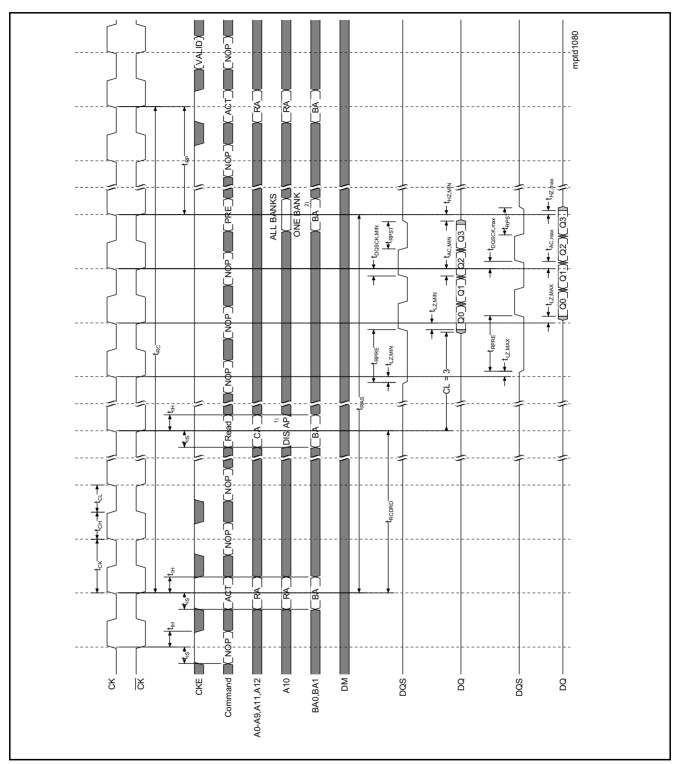


Figure 42 Bank Read Access (Burst Length = 4)

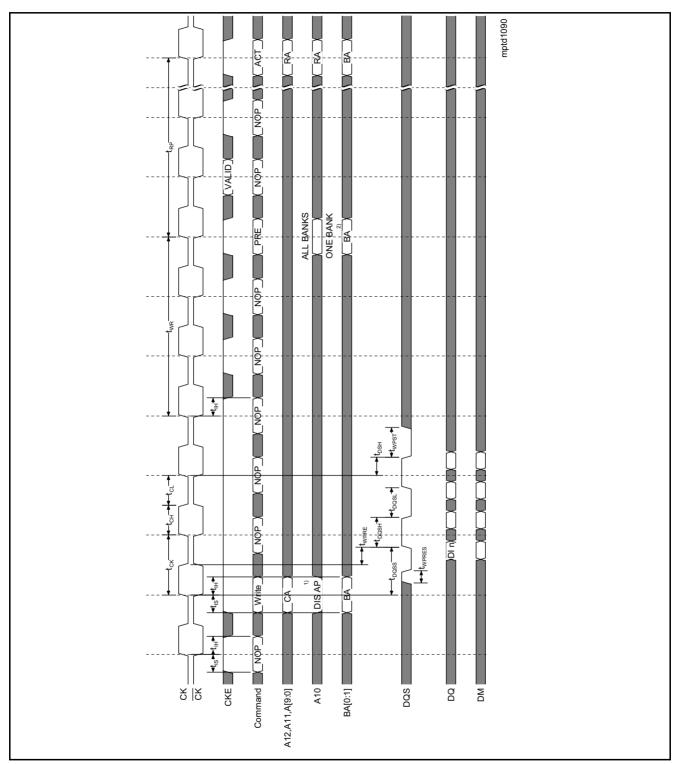


Figure 43 Write without Auto Precharge (Burst Length = 4)

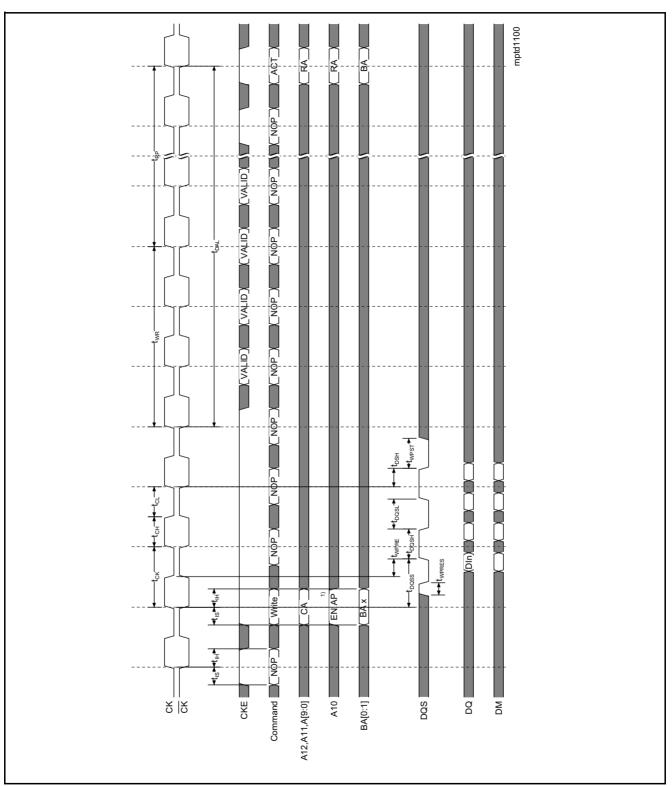


Figure 44 Write with Auto Precharge (Burst Length = 4)

- 4. The Timing reference is shown with respect to Vref-Crossing.



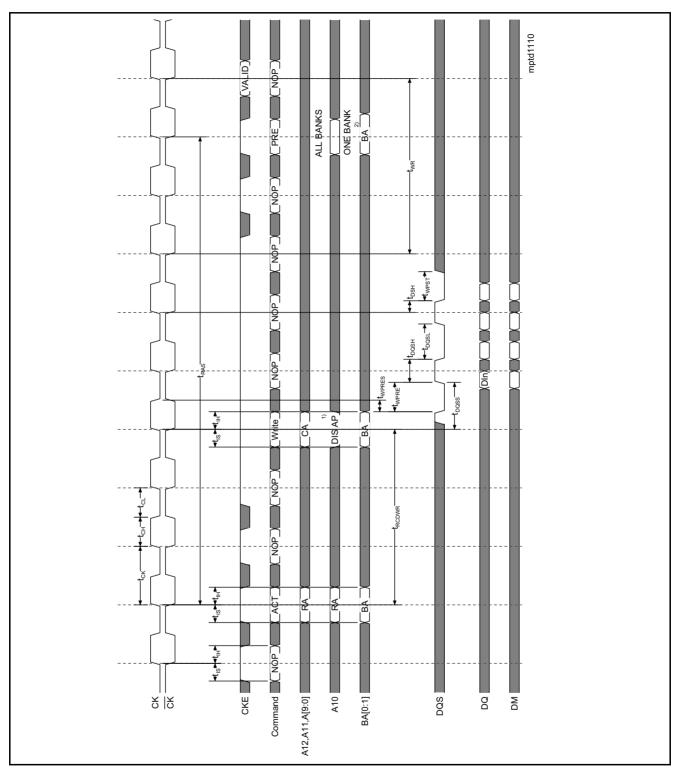


Figure 45 Bank Write Access (Burst Length = 4)

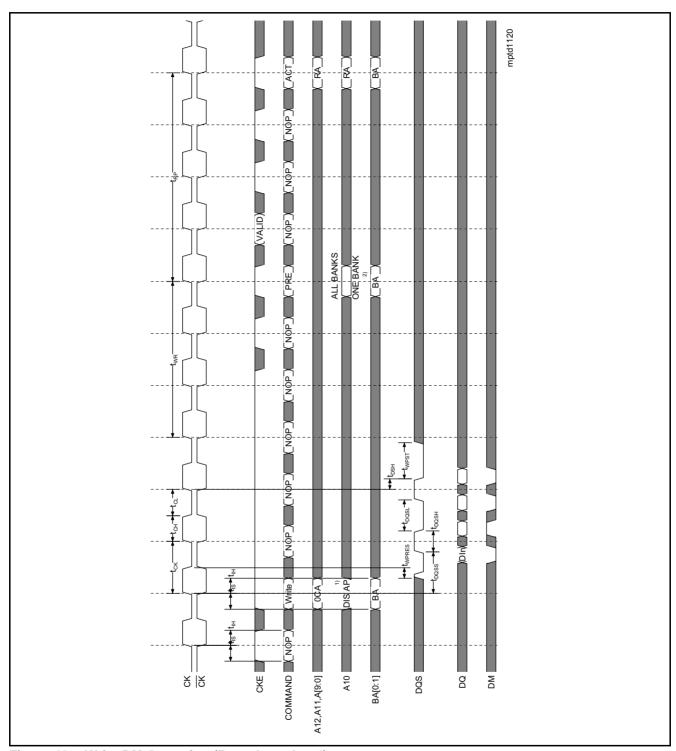


Figure 46 Write DM Operation (Burst Length = 4)

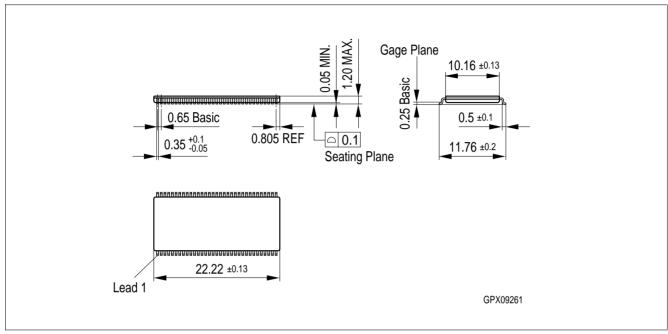


Figure 47 P-TSOPII-66-1 (Plastic Thin Small Outline Package Type II)

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
